

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Queen Anne style. Front facing gable roof. Two story, partial width pedimented gable porch. End Doric column supports. Glass and wood paneled door flanked by 1/1 window. Large multi-light first floor window. Second floor round tower with conical roof. 1/1 second floor window. Rectangular window at roof eave. South side has three-story pedimented gable bay.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A modified Queen Anne style residential structure. Woodward Avenue runs parallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to the northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is less curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward Avenue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city by five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the section north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections of Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a suburban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special directness toward town."
