

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two story frame American Four Square. Hip roof with hipped dormers on the west and south facades. Modillion-like brackets in the eaves of the dormers and roof. Exterior brick chimney on south side of house. Porch across front of house has stapered squared posts and a stick balustrade. Entranceway on the second floor porch has multi-paned double doors with sidelights. Bay window to the south of second floor optranceway

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Good example of the American Four Square that was built in the Parkside neighborhood. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
