

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Hip roof. Full- width hip roof porch has brick base, fluted doric columns supporting entablature with brackets under cornice. Wood paneled door flanked by pilaster strips supporting entablature with dentils and decorated with Adamesque details. Flanking rectangular window with SICNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1900 with paneled apron. Flanking pilaster strips support
ARCHITECT: entablature. Second floor has a set of semi- hexagonal bays, 1/1 lights. Pilaster strips flank
BUILDER: windows. Adamesque details decorate entablature. End Ionic pilaster strips. Dentils and acanthus
dormer has Palladian window.
A Colonial Revival style residence with Adamesque details. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
