



So the Co man had a in the state of the stat	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four quare. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to olvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's aps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue ad been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to thecity by five different owners over span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a uburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness oward the town."
