

Building is situated on a small sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.  18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):  Two story Dtuch Colonial style. Gambrel roof. Full-width hip roof wing has a pair of three-part windows, 6/1 lights each. Center chimney flanked by 9/1 windows. South side has entrance. Glass paneled door with flared hip roof hood. Shed roof dormers have three-part 6/1 windows flanked by single 6/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A vernacular version of the Dutch Colonial Revival adapted to a narrow urban building lot. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."  21.
