

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's
Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from
Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on
the National Register, and northeast of the Zoo.

Two and a half story frame residence with front facing gable
roof. Bargeboard with square ends. Partial width gabled wing,
shingled. Band of 5 single light windows. Clapboard first floor
has 6/1 windows. Shingled second floor and gable. Second floor
has three part and two part 6/1 windows. Band course at gable
SIGNIFICANCE level. Gable has three part 6/1 windows. Curved

BUILDER:
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simple form of Prairie
School styling with gable roof and added gable wing. Crescent
Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside
subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street.
This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The
Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been
modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of
five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892
near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside
subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood
street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
