

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and north of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two story bungalow style. Side gable roof with front extension that provides first floor wing and porch roof. Wing has horizontal band of 4 windows, 4 vertical lights over 1. Square corner porch support. 3 light wood paneled door flanked by small rectangular leaded glass sidelights. Gable roof dormer has bargeboard and SIGNIFICANCE triangular knee braces. Three part window has center window, 5 vertical lights 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1922 over 1 and 3 vertical lights

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A typical adaptation of the bungalow style. Similar to 655 Crescent in building plan. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town." 21.
