

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and north of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two story residential structure. Gable roof with front-facing stepped parapet. Full-width one story wing has stepped parapet. Four 6/1 light windows with end shutters. Recessed entrance has 12 light door. Second floor has a set of paired 6/1 windows with window shutters. 6 light square window in gable. East side entrance has entrance hood, stepped parapet, bracket SIGNIFICANCE supports with pendant ends. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1923

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The unique quality of this residential structure is seen in the pronounced stepped parapet, a feature that is rather uncommon to domestic structures. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin.
