

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and north of the Zoo.	
Two story with Tudor style influence. Side gable roof with curved knee brackets under eave. Massive gabled entrance porch has bargeboard with ogee arch formation, paired paired slender square supports, end brackets. Arched span between supports. End front facing gable bay. Bargeboard with end significance brackets. First floor 5 part window, 6/6 lights 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1922 each. Second floor segmental arched tri-part window, 6/6 lights. Pediment supported by corbel stops caps second BUILDER: floor. Rectangular gable window.	
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Twentieth century adaptation of the Tudor style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded tothe city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town." 21.
