Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear reet in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt enue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's rly 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans r Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current rm. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five ferent owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 ar Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue gins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following
