

lor fro	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Crescent Avenue is the negest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching om Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on insted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's ans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its crent form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city five different owners over a span of five years, beginning 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent enue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following insted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead the special directness toward the town."
