17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and north of the Zoo.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Tudor style modified with Prairie School influence. Front facing gable roof. Stone first floor. Smooth regular course stone with rough cut stone quoins. Entrance has glass and wood paneled door, sidelights. Lintel. First floor windows have horizontal and vertical bands in top light. Lintel. Second floor has horizontal and vertical decorative half-timbering. SIGNIFICANCE 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1911 Projecting gabled two-story bay. Bargeboard. Balconey
ARCHITECT: supported by brackets, curvilinear balusters. Windows imitate first floor. Gable has pair of square windows. BUILDER: Through the cornice gabled dormers on east and west side.
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A unique composite of the Tudor and Prairie School styles. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
